

She informed the Board that the reasons the Department is deferring the Document Management System project are because the IT Division has a very heavy workload, with the rollout of the Maximo, Kronos, and the ongoing CIS systems, and they also are having resource issues with the retirement of one of their senior supervising section heads. They felt that if they deferred the project until next fiscal year, they could give it fuller attention.

Karen Tom of the Human Resources (HR) Office gave the report. She stated that that civil service employee population has increased by three and there should be a continued increase since many of the supervisory positions, which are normally filled in-house, have been filled. Thus, the Department can now begin hiring from the outside to fill entry or experienced level positions. She added that during February, the divisions were interviewing for 18 positions and worked on interview questions for 20 positions. Twenty-two classification actions are pending with the Department of Human Resources (DHR) and HR is waiting for 12 lists of candidates, from DHR.

Subject: Status Update of Groundwater Levels at All Index

Stations

For the production week that ended on March 7, 2015, there were no aquifer index wells within low groundwater status. The weekly production average for the period was 134.18 million gallons per day.

The Board of Water Supply rainfall index for the month of February 2015 was 27 percent of normal, with a 5-month moving average of 69 percent. As of March 10, 2015, the Hawaii Drought Monitor shows abnormally dry conditions across Oahu, except for the southern coast of the island, which exhibits more severe "moderate drought" conditions.

The National Weather Service is forecasting below-normal rainfall through May 2015, associated with El Niño. Subsequently, above-normal rainfall is anticipated for July through September 2015.

Index monitor wells exhibit level to slightly decreasing trends, reflecting the counteracting influences of limited rainfall and seasonal reductions in pumpage.
